Cowboy Boot Camps Building Confidence, Connection, and Camaraderie

On a cool October morning, veterans gathered in the arena not knowing exactly what the day would bring, but ready to show up for one another.

Cowboy Boot Camp returned on Friday, October 4, 2025, in partnership with the Birmingham Vet Center, welcoming eight veterans alongside staff, volunteers, and three steady horses who quietly set the tone for the day. From introductions to hands-on horsemanship, the arena became a place of trust, laughter, learning, and honest conversation.

Supported by Alabama Veteran and Norfolk Southern, participants explored leadership, communication, and awareness through guided horse interactions. A special farrier demonstration offered a behind-the-scenes look at equine care, sparking curiosity and meaningful dialogue.

The day closed with fellowship and a shared meal provided by Ya Betta Eat Cajun Smokehouse—reinforcing the camaraderie that defines Cowboy Boot Camp and reminding us that connection often grows strongest around the table.

Friday mornings at BondFire Ranch are filled with purpose.

Throughout the quarter, Homeschool Fridays continued to grow alongside the expansion of our Homeschool Wrangler Training days. Youth stepped into real responsibility, handling horses, caring for the barn, stewarding the land, and tending the pond, learning leadership through consistency, teamwork, and service.

December welcomed 2 new Wranglers, guided by 3 returning seniors who modeled responsibility and mentorship. What begins as a ranch day often becomes something more, a place where confidence builds, friendships form, and young leaders discover their ability to contribute meaningfully to their community.

Behind the Scenes: Caring for the Herd

Much of the most meaningful work at BondFire Ranch happens quietly, away from the spotlight.

Throughout the quarter, our team remained deeply committed to the daily care and long-term well-being of the horses who make our programs possible. In October and again in December, Jodi, our farrier, spent time at the ranch trimming hooves, ensuring soundness, and keeping the herd healthy from the ground up. As he worked, stories were shared, questions were asked, and learning happened naturally.

In early October, our mare Beautiful received veterinary treatment for an eye irritation and showed steady improvement with attentive daily care.

December also brought continued bodywork sessions using the Masterson Method with Brave. While this was not her first experience with the method, familiarity did not lessen its impact. Brave once again leaned into the process, releasing tension and receiving the benefits of responsive, intentional care.

By caring for our herd behind the scenes, we ensure they are ready; physically and emotionally, to stand alongside us in every program.

Connecting Across Alabama—and Beyond

Connection doesn't stop at the ranch gate.

This quarter was marked by meaningful relationship-building across Alabama and beyond. In October, we welcomed Rob from AL2LA to explore collaboration opportunities supporting military and veteran communities.

Our reach extended nationally as we participated in the Horses for Mental Health Open House Call, engaging in broader conversations around best practices and shared learning. During this call, we also learned more about the upcoming Horses for Mental Health Campaign planned for May 2026 and we have begun drafting an application to participate.

In November, BondFire Ranch supported the Alabama Department of Veterans Affairs by promoting the statewide Veteran feedback survey as part of Alabama's Challenge to Prevent Veteran Suicide.

December brought continued momentum with meetings alongside the Central Alabama Marines Council and strengthened ties with Veterans K9Equine Alliance, Samson's Strength Sustainable Veterans Project, and Mustangs and Heroes. Also, we were given the opportunity to participate in Alabama Veterans Resource Center Non-Profit Roundtable discussion.

Progress at BondFire Ranch is built one project, one volunteer, and one shared vision at a time.


In October, two round pens were combined to create a 60' x 120' outdoor arena supporting future programming. November marked the opening of the new Training Room, made possible by the Alabama Power Foundation, and welcomed Scout Troop 28 for horsemanship training, a service projects, and fishing activities.

In December, volunteers gathered for Winter Ranch Clean-Up Day, preparing the ranch for the season ahead.

This quarter marked the successful completion of the Pond Project. A final grant report was submitted to the Holle Family Foundation, whose generous support made our Fishing for Connection program possible—transforming vision into a living space for learning, reflection, and connection.
